


Acton Congregational Church

The Trustees





We're privileged to be rich in space to worship, celebrate and support each other, including our beautiful sanctuary and spacious Hartman Hall. Our building supports activities that further the work of our church, provides a home for our Cornerstone Thrift Shop, and an affordable, safe space for community groups. This year, we had major expenses for a new roof and organ repairs. We received some generous donations to help with the organ repairs and we coupled the roof replacement with our solar panel project to off-set future electricity costs. While we have paid off the mortgage for the building, the maintenance costs continue to rise as our building ages.

We have been consistently blessed with Trustees and members who show their gratitude for God's love by working tirelessly to manage our finances, personnel, technology and building. Without these volunteers, our operating costs would be much higher. Your gifts help support our building, which is at the center of our faith community.

In my many years at Acton Congregational Church, I've been blessed to experience the many ways faith manifests itself within our community, and it reminds me of the familiar line from 1 John 3:18, "let us not love in word or in tongue, but in deed and in truth." This verse is familiar to us because it's central to our faith expression. Our collective "deeds and truth" define our faith community and enable us to respond to our changing world while remaining true to our faith. Whether it was the decision to become Opening and Affirming, or the prayerful process to determine the best outcome for our properties at 8 and 20 Concord Road, I've been proud to be part of ACC's leadership team that has recently navigated these thoughtful decisions. Experiencing this provided me with inspiration to do more.

As I look to the future, it's become clear that both our community and our world are changing in manifest ways, both of which the 2023-2024 Strategic Planning Task Force drafted recommendations to begin to address. In parallel, as 2023 Trustee Co-Chair, these concerns inspired me to lead a push for ACC to make for a more sustainable building use model and to reduce our carbon footprint. One way to do this was to use our facility at 12 Concord Road to produce renewable energy by installing solar panels. Although the "word" of installing solar panels at ACC had been discussed for some time, I and many others felt that now was time for it to become a "deed" in service to both our community and to the future of our planet. Emphasizing this point, Mark Lauritano at our January 2024 Annual Meeting, described our solar panel installation as "an act on our shared covenant and care for future generations", and supported it by excerpts from our Mission Statement to "work for justice and equity for all people" and to "respect and conserve God's earth". This was truly a deed many of us were inspired to complete!

The twelve-month process to install solar panels was necessarily a community affair. It was a rewarding combination of both faith in action and traditional project planning. For me personally, I found the ACC leadership team and congregational encouragement reassuring and inspiring. I was also proud to represent ACC to our broader community, including conversations with Matt Leibman, Solar Project Coordinator at Temple Beth Elohim; Neil Gordon, CEO of Acton Children's Discovery Museum; Bob Nail, President of Massachusetts Interfaith Power and Light; and the Acton Historic District Commission, among many others. Finally, the working relationships I formed with other members of ACC's Environmental Sustainability Task Force, Chuck Floyd, Tom Gillispie, Mark Lauritano, John Scaletta, and Allen Warner were greatly appreciated as they're all a true blessing to ACC!

Now that the installation is complete and I reflect on the long, but rewarding, process, I'm reminded of James 2:17-18, "In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead. But someone will say, 'You have faith; I have deeds.' Show me your faith without deeds, and I will show you my faith by my deeds." -Rod Kunz
